### **OSHA** Statute

- Debated in Congress ~50 years ago
- Modified slightly mostly for penalties
- Lacks teeth in criminal sanctions
- After 45 years of court rulings and additional laws – standards development under the Act can not keep up with the science or needs

## OSHA \$ Penalties Adjusted as of August 2016

Type of Violation

Old Maximum Penalty New Maximum Penalty

Failure to Abate

\$7,000 per day beyond the abatement date \$12,471 per day beyond the abatement date

Willful or Repeated

\$70,000 per violation

\$124,709 per violation

### **OSHA** Statute

 Section 17(e) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act ("OSH Act") provides for a Class B misdemeanor criminal penalty, including imprisonment up to six months and substantial monetary fines if an employer's willful violation of any OSHA standard causes the death of an employee.

### **OSHA** Criminal Sanctions

- Since 1970 >400,000 workplace fatalities
- < 80 OSH Act criminal cases prosecuted</li>
- ~ 12 resulted in criminal convictions
- Prosecutions typically targeted falsified documents, lied to investigators

## Atlantic States Cast Iron Pipe Company

September 2012, four former managers lost their appeal of prison sentences and financial penalties associated with several safety and environmental compliance violations, and cover-up.

- 70 months in prison plant manager
- 41 months in prison HR/Safety manager
- 30 months in prison maintenance supervisor
- 6 months in prison for a supervisor.

Classified as felonies in all the federal environmental statutes except for the toxic substances and pesticide statutes.




- 40 offices nationwide






